## RULES AND ORDERS OF THE CITY COUNCIL

Section 1. At the beginning of each municipal year there shall be elected by a viva voce vote in each branch of the City Council, a Joint Standing Committee on Finance, consisting of two on the part of the Board of Aldermen and three on the part of the Common Council. The President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Common Council shall be members of said Committee, *ex-officio*.

Sec. 2. At the beginning of each municipal year there shall be appointed by the presiding officers of their respective Boards, Joint Standing Committees as follows:

- A Committee on Charities
- A Committee on Claims.
- A Committee on Education.
- A Committee on Fire Department.
- A Committee on Legislative Matters.
- A Committee on Lighting Streets.
- A Committee on Military Affairs.
- A Committee on Ordinances.
- A Committee on Police Department.
- A Committee on Public Buildings.
- A Committee on Printing.

- A Committee on Sewers.
- A Committee on Streets.
- A Committee on Water.
- A Committee on Public Health
- A Committee on Resolutions.

A Committee to assign the Mayor's Inaugural Address and all unfinished business of the previous year.

Each of the aforesaid appointed committees shall consist of three Aldermen and four Common Councilmen, except that the Committee on Streets shall consist of two Aldermen and three Common Councilmen, and that the President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Common Council, respectively, shall be members of the Committee on Streets, *ex-officio*.

Sec. 3. The President of the Board of Aldermen, shall be, *ex-officio*, Chairman of any Joint Committee of which he is a member, and in case of his inability, the Alderman first named shall be Chairman, and in case of his inability, the member of the same Board next in order, and after him the President of the Common Council shall be Chairman; of other Joint Committees the Alderman first named shall be Chairman, and in case of his inability, the member of the same Board next in order, and in case of his in-

ability the member of the same board next in order and after him the member of the Common Council first in order shall be Chairman. The Chairman shall call meetings of the committees at his discretion, or at the written request of a majority of the members.

Sec. 4. Any vacancy occurring in any committee shall be filled in the same manner as provided for the creation of the committee.

Sec. 5. Joint Standing Committees shall cause records to be kept of their proceedings, in books provided by the city for that purpose.

Sec. 6. All reports and other papers submitted to the City Council, except ordinances, the passage of which is recommended by the Committee on Ordinances, shall be typewritten or written in a fair hand, all orders shall be without interlineation or erasure, and all ordinances, the passage of which is recommended by the Committee on Ordinances shall be neatly printed with the lines of each section numbered in consecutive order, beginning with number one. The clerks of the Boards, respectively, shall make copies of any papers to be reported by committees at the request of the respective chairman thereof.

Sec. 7. It shall be the duty of every Joint Committee to whom any subject shall be referred, unless otherwise ordered, to report thereon, within four weeks, or ask for further time.

Sec. 8. No committee shall act by separate consultation, and no reports, except minority reports, shall be received, unless they shall have been agreed to in committee actually assembled, and no report shall be received recommending the expenditure of money unless it shall contain a careful estimate of the amount required.

Sec. 9. When any matter is referred to a joint committee, the City Clerk shall furnish the clerk of such committee with a copy of the original of all votes or papers pertaining to the subject matter referred, within forty-eight hours. The reports of all committees, except in case of committees of conference, may be made to either board, and shall be signed by the Clerk of Committees unless there is a minority report.

Sec. 10. When either board shall non-concur with the other in action upon any ordinance, order or resolution requiring concurrent action, notice of such non-concurrence shall forthwith be given.

Sec. 11. In every case of disagreement on any matter requiring the joint action of the two boards, if either board shall request a conference and appoint a committee for that purpose, the other board shall appoint a committee to confer with them; each committee shall consist of three members on the part of each board representing its vote. Said committee shall meet at a time appointed by the chairman of the committee on the part of the board requesting the conference, and state to each other the reasons of their respective boards, for or against the proposed action, and report at the same or at the next regular meeting; and their report, if agreed to by a majority of each committee, shall be first acted on by the board asking the conference, and may be either accepted or rejected.

Sec. 12. Each board shall transmit to the other all papers on which any ordinance, joint order or resolution shall be founded, and all papers on their passage between the two boards shall be under the signatures of their respective clerks or presiding officers.

Sec. 13. Every joint resolution shall have as many readings in each board as the rules of that board require, after which the question shall be on

passing the same, and upon being passed in each board, shall be signed by the President thereof.

Sec. 14. Every ordinance shall have as many readings in each board as the rules of that board require, after which the question shall be on passing the same to be enrolled, and when the same shall have been so passed, it shall be sent to the other board for concurrence; and when such ordinance shall have so passed, in each board, the same shall be enrolled by the Clerk of the Common Council and examined by a committee of that board, and on being found by said committee to be correctly enrolled, the same shall be reported to the Council when the question shall be on passing the same to be ordained, and when said ordinance shall have so passed to be ordained it shall be signed by the President of the Common Council and sent to the other board, where a like examination shall be made by a committee of that board, and, if found correctly enrolled, the same shall be reported to the board, and the question shall be on passing the same to be ordained; and when the same shall have so passed to be ordained, it shall be signed by the President of the Board of Aldermen.



Sec. 15. After the annual appropriations have been made no subsequent expenditure shall be authorized, for any object, unless by appropriation from any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, or by expressly creating therefor a city debt; but no such debt shall be created unless the order authorizing the same pass by the affirmative votes of two-thirds of the whole number of each branch of the City Council voting by yeas and nays

Sec. 16. No expenditure shall be made for the celebration of holidays, and for other purposes of a public nature, unless the order authorizing such expenditure shall be adopted by a vote of two-thirds of the members of each branch of the City Council present and voting by yeas and nays

Sec. 17. The City Clerk shall be clerk of the City Council in convention.

Sec. 18. All city officers shall be elected by a viva voce vote in the manner provided by Sec. 7, Chap. 26, of the Revised Laws, or any acts in amendment thereof.

Sec. 19. Either board may hold its meeting at such time as it may determine without concurrent action on the part of both boards, but at the request

of either board a concurrent meeting may be held at such time as both branches may appoint.

Sec. 20. When there occurs any difference of opinion as regarding modes of proceeding not otherwise provided for, the City Council shall be governed by parliamentary practice as set forth in Cushing's "Manual of the Law and Practice of Legislative Assemblies."

Sec. 21. Reports, orders, ordinances, and resolutions requiring concurrent action must be in possession of the City Clerk on or before two o'clock in the afternoon of the Friday preceding the day of a meeting of either board, or be postponed until the next meeting.

Sec. 22. The clerk of each board shall prepare for each meeting a calendar of matters in order for consideration, a list of matters lying on the table, and such other matter or memoranda as he may deem necessary, and as either board or its President may direct, and furnish the same to the City Clerk, who shall cause the same to be printed and distributed among the members of the City Council.

Sec. 23. Every order, resolve or other paper requiring concurrent action offered in either board by a member thereof shall be endorsed by him,

and if the subject matter is referred to a committee, and if he so requests he shall be notified, by the clerk of committees, of the time and place when said subject matter is to be considered.

## RULES AND ORDERS OF THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN

Section 1. The order of business shall be as follows:—

First. The President shall call the board to order; and if a quorum be present, shall cause the roll to be called and the names of the absentees recorded.

Second. The journal of the previous meeting shall be read.

Third. Petitions, reports and other papers requiring the action of the Common Council shall be called for and be disposed of by reference or otherwise.

Fourth. The orders of the day shall be taken up—meaning by the orders of the day, the business remaining unfinished at the previous meeting, and such communications as may have been subsequently sent up from the Common Council.

Fifth. New business may be introduced by any member of the board.

Sixth. Such nominations, appointments and elections as may be in order, shall be considered and disposed of.

**Sec. 2.** Every ordinance shall pass through the following stages before it shall be considered as having received the final action of this board, viz: first reading, second reading, passage to be enrolled, passage to be ordained; and every joint resolution shall have two several readings before the question shall be taken on its final passage.

**Sec. 3.** A resolve, an order for appropriating money, or an ordinance, may be rejected at either stage in its progress, but may not pass through all its stages in one day except by general consent.

**Sec. 4.** Standing committees shall be appointed on assessments for sewers; on assessments for streets betterments; on enrollment; on bills in the second reading; on street railways; and on elections and returns.

**Sec. 5.** No member shall be interrupted while speaking but by a call to order or for a correction of a mistake, nor shall there be any conversation among the members while a paper is being read, or a question stated from the chair.

**Sec. 6.** On all questions and motions whatsoever the President shall take the sense of the board by yeas and

nays provided one-fourth of the members present shall so require.

**Sec. 7.** The foregoing rules and order of business shall be observed in all cases, unless suspended for a specific purpose by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

**Sec. 8.** All committees shall be appointed and announced by the President unless the board shall determine otherwise.

## RULES AND ORDERS OF THE COMMON COUNCIL

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### Rights and Duties of the President

Section 1. The president shall take the chair at the hour appointed for the meeting, call the members to order, and, if a quorum be present, cause the roll to be called and the names of the absentees recorded. He shall then call for the reading of the minutes of the preceding meeting, and proceed to business.

Sec. 2. He shall preserve order and decorum, may speak to points of order in preference to other members and shall decide all such questions, subject to an appeal to the council by motion regularly seconded; and no other business shall be in order until the question on the appeal shall have been decided. He shall also nominate all committees not elected, unless the council shall determine otherwise.

Sec. 3. He shall arise to address the council, to state facts or to put a question; but may read sitting.

Sec. 4. When a question is under debate, the president shall receive no motion but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone to a certain day, to commit, to amend or to postpone indefinitely; which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are arranged. He shall declare all votes, but if a vote be doubted he shall order a return of the number voting in the affirmative and in the negative without any further debate.

Sec. 5. He may call any member to the chair for a period of time not extending beyond an adjournment; and when out of the chair the president may participate in any debate; but shall not resume the chair while the same question is pending; and on going into committee of the whole he shall appoint the chairman.

Sec. 6. Questions shall be propounded in the order in which they are moved, unless the subsequent motion be previous in its nature; except that in naming sums and fixing times, the largest sum and the longest time shall be first put.

Sec. 7. After a motion is stated by the president, it shall be disposed of

by a vote of the council, unless withdrawn by the mover before an amendment or decision.

Sec. 8. A motion to adjourn and the motion to lay on the table shall be decided without debate.

Sec. 9. The previous question shall be put in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" It shall only be admitted when demanded by a majority of the members present, and until it is decided, shall preclude all amendment and debate of the main question, and after the adoption of the previous question, the sense of the council shall forthwith be taken upon amendments reported by a committee, upon all pending amendments and then upon the main question

Sec. 10. On all questions and motions whatsoever, the president shall take the sense of the council by yeas and nays provided one-fifth of the members present shall so require.

Sec. 11. When two or more members rise at the same time, the president shall name the member who is to speak first.

### Rights and Duties of Members

Sec. 12. In case of a vacancy in the office of President the Council shall proceed forthwith to elect a President, the oldest senior member present presiding, and no other business, except a motion to adjourn to a time specified or to take a recess, shall be in order until an election by vote of a majority of those present and voting is affected. In the absence of the president the member present whose election is of the earliest date shall call the council to order, and preside until a president pro tempore shall be chosen; if it shall appear that there are two or more members whose election is of equal early date, seniority in years shall determine who shall call the council to order; and if an election is not effected on the first trial, on the second trial a plurality of votes shall elect. When any member is about to speak in the council, he shall rise in his place and respectfully address the presiding officer, confining himself to the question under debate, and avoiding personalities.

Sec. 13. No member shall be mentioned in the debate by his name, but may be described by the place he occupies or such other designation as may be intelligible and respectful.

Sec. 14. No member speaking shall be interrupted by another but by a call to order or to correct a mistake.

Sec. 15. No member shall speak more than once on a question to the prevention of any other who has not spoken, and desires to speak; nor more than twice without the consent of the board; and all questions relating to the priority of business shall be taken without debate.

Sec. 16. When the president or any other member is speaking, no one shall stand up or pass unnecessarily before the person speaking.

Sec. 17. Every motion shall be reduced to writing, if the president or any member require it.

Sec. 18. A motion to reconsider a vote shall only be in order at the same or the meeting next succeeding that at which the vote was passed. If a motion is made to reconsider a vote at the same meeting at which it is passed, and it is moved to postpone its consideration until the next meeting, such motion to postpone shall require for its adoption the affirmative vote of but one-third of the members voting; and, provided further, that no action of the council upon a motion to

reconsider a vote, upon an incidental or subsidiary question, shall remove the main subject under consideration from before it. When a motion for reconsideration is decided, that decision shall not be reconsidered. The motion to "postpone until the next meeting" the consideration of a motion to reconsider a vote shall not be debatable, and shall not be in order on and after the last Monday in December.

Sec. 19. Every member who shall be in the council when a question is put, shall give his vote, unless the council for special reasons excuse him, or unless his private interest is involved therein.

Pairs may be arranged between members and when announced in open session shall be made a matter of record.

Sec. 20. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration, shall be admitted under color of an amendment.

Sec. 21. All reports may be committed or recommitted at the pleasure of the council. And when a motion is made to refer a subject, and different committees are proposed the question shall be taken in the order following:

A standing committee of the Council.

A select committee of the council.

A joint standing committee.

A joint select committee.

Sec. 22. All questions shall be decided when the sense will admit of it, if called for by any member of the council.

Sec. 23. No rule or standing order of the council shall be suspended unless three fourths of the members present consent thereto, nor shall any rule or order be repealed or amended without at least one day's notice being given of the motion therefor, nor unless a majority of the whole council concur therein.

Sec. 24. No member shall be obliged to serve on more than two committees at the same time nor be chairman of more than one, nor on any committee having in charge matter touching his individual interest.

Sec. 25. All differences of opinion in regard to points of order or modes of proceeding not otherwise provided for shall be governed by parliamentary practice as set forth in Cushing's "Law and Practice of Legislative Assemblies."

### Communications, Committees, Reports, Resolutions, etc.

Sec. 26. All papers addressed to the council shall be presented by the president or by a member in his place, and shall be read by the president, clerk, or such other persons as the president may request, and shall be taken up in the order in which they were presented unless when the council shall otherwise direct.

Sec. 27. Standing committees shall be appointed on bills in the second reading, on enrollment, and on street railways. The committee on street railways shall consist of four members.

Sec. 28. No committee shall sit during the sitting of the council without special leave, except committees of conference, the committee on the second reading of bills and ordinances, and the committee on enrollment; and such special leave shall not be granted without the consent of three-fourths of the members present and voting.

Sec. 29. The rules of proceeding in the council shall be observed in the committee of the whole, so far as they may be applicable except the rule limiting the times of speaking.

Sec. 30. When a committee is nominated by the president, the first person named shall be the chairman, unless the president himself is a member of that committee, in which case he shall be the chairman. In elections of committees when the chairman is not specially chosen, the person having the highest number of votes shall act as chairman, and in case of an equality of votes between two or more members of a committee, the members thereof shall choose a chairman.

Sec. 31. All ordinances, orders and resolutions shall have two several readings before they shall be finally passed by the council.

Sec. 32. All ordinances, before being read the second time, shall be referred to the committee on the second reading of bills and ordinances; and after being reported upon by said committee, shall be again read, after which second reading the question shall be on passing the same to be enrolled. An ordinance shall not pass through all its stages in one day.

Sec. 33. All ordinances, orders or resolutions, imposing penalties or authorizing the expenditure of money whether the same may have been ap-

propriated or not, and all orders or resolutions authorizing loans, shall have but one reading on the same day, in case an objection to the second reading is made and sustained by the affirmative votes of one-fourth of the members present and voting; provided, however, that nothing herein contained shall prevent the passage of an order at any meeting of the council to authorize the printing of any documents relating to the affairs of the city.

Sec. 34. The seats of the common council shall be numbered, and determined by lot, and no member shall change his seat but by permission of the president.

Sec. 35. All committees of the council shall consist of three members, unless a different number be specially ordered. And no report shall be received from any committee unless actually assembled; and all reports shall be in writing.

Sec. 36. It shall be the duty of every committee of the council to whom any subject may be specially referred, to report thereon within four weeks, or ask further time.



### **Elections**

Sec. 37. All officers not appointed shall be elected by a viva voce vote each member who is present answering to his name when it is called by the clerk or other proper officer, and stating the name of the person for whom he votes, or declining to vote, as the case may be; and the clerk or other proper officer shall record every such vote.

### **Duties of Clerk, etc.**

Sec. 38. The clerk shall keep brief minutes of the votes and proceedings of the council, entering thereon all accepted resolutions; he shall notice reports and memorials, and other papers submitted to the board, only by their titles, or a brief description of their purport. When the yeas and nays are taken, the clerk shall call the names of all the members except the president in alphabetical order.

Sec. 39. The clerk of the common council shall keep the record of committees who may require that service; and on the appointment of every standing committee, a book of record shall be provided by its chairman or by said clerk; and the clerk shall

have the custody of all the minutes by him kept, and the records of the several committees shall be open to the inspection of the members of the city council.

Sec. 40. The clerk shall notify in writing the chairman of all committees of the council of the appointment of such committees.
