Worcester HEARS: IMPLEMENTATION PROJECT GRANT SUMMARY

Significant Health Anomaly

The Worcester Healthy Environments and Resiliency in Schools (HEARS) project will address the significant health anomaly of *Adverse Childhood Experiences* (ACEs). The Center for Disease Control and Prevention defines ACEs as: "Childhood abuse, neglect, and exposure to other traumatic stressors.\(^{1}\)" This includes: physical abuse, sexual abuse, emotional abuse and neglect\(^{2}\). The Kaiser Permanente Foundation collected an extensive dataset tracking the effect of Adverse Childhood Experiences on adult health outcomes, and found "a graded relationship between the number of categories of childhood exposure and each of the adult health risk behaviors and diseases that were studied\(^{3}\). This research has guided the field of childhood trauma and Adverse Childhood Experiences since the report came out in 1998. The CDC claims that child maltreatment has serious early life and late life effects on individuals. In the short term (childhood) ACES can negatively effect brain development, cognitive and social emotional abilities, and language development. In the long term (adulthood) it can cause blindness, cerebral palsy, high risk for heart, lung liver and other diseases and anxiety, and can indicate a high risk for smoking, alcohol and drug abuse\(^{4}\).

The societal effect of childhood trauma and maltreatment is extremely high, and according to According to the past president of the American Academy of Pediatrics, "Children's exposure to Adverse Childhood experiences (ACES) is the greatest unaddressed public health threat of our time.⁵" The Worcester HEARS project will address the widespread and severe public health anomaly of Adverse Childhood Experiences within selected Worcester Public Schools, and work to create a more trauma informed and resilient school district.

Target Group

The Worcester Public School District is a large, diverse, low income urban school district composed of 44 schools. The five schools chosen as Worcester HEARS pilot schools consists of a high minority, low income population that is representative of the district as a whole. Students struggle with poverty, homelessness, language barriers, and a lack of infrastructure in the area of the city in which schools are located. The chart below illustrates the size of each school, and several relevant indicators in student demographics. These students are the target population for the Worcester HEARS grant program. The information is current as of the end of the 2014-2015 school year.

The target schools are: Rice Square elementary, Grafton St. elementary, Roosevelt elementary, City View elementary, and Worcester East Middle School.

The Worcester School District is a diverse district, and the subset of students included in the pilot schools represent a variety of racial backgrounds, economic backgrounds, and disciplinary records. This set of target schools includes a wide age group, Kindergarten through 8th grade.

All students in the five schools will participate in the HEARS program, as it will include a universal intervention for all students within the five schools. Parents and families will be heavily recruited to participate as well. They will receive streamlined access to behavioral and mental health services, training in trauma and its effect on learning, and their input will be valuable in the planning process of the grant. We have already reached out to a variety of community partners in the North Quadrant, who will assist the district in communicating with families in the target neighborhoods.

Teachers and school support staff will be introduced to the HEARS program through their principals, and a large workshop with all participating HEARS educators in August, 2016. This will include a workshop by Joel Ristuccia, a national expert in Trauma and Learning. They will have an opportunity to provide feedback on the workshop itself, and the eventual plan for changes to school practices. Teachers who are interested in more responsibility will apply to take a sequence of four Lesley courses which will prepare them to be leaders within their school on Trauma Sensitive Education.

IMPLEMENTATION PROJECT GOALS

- Goal 1: The Worcester HEARS project will enhance intervention schools, and create a safer and more supportive environment:
- Goal 2: The Worcester HEARS Project will enhance educator knowledge and teachers will implement trauma sensitive approaches to their practice:
- Goal 3: The Worcester HEARS project will build resilience within students at HEARS schools. Resilience is defined as: Emotional awareness, self-regulation, impulse control, optimism, flexible and accurate thinking, empathy, self-efficacy and the ability to reach out to teachers or peers for help.
- Goal 4: The Worcester HEARS Project will increase and strengthen district partnerships, including higher education organizations, non-profits, and mental health agencies
- Goal 5: The Worcester HEARS Project will increase and strengthen family engagement within the participating school community.

STRATEGIES

To accomplish the above goals, we will implement a strategic, trauma sensitive schools model based on best practices developed by two partnering organizations: Mass Advocates for Children and the Massachusetts Task Force on Behavioral Health and Public Schools. These two organizations have collaborated to publish a state wide list of recommendations and best practices in creating safe and supportive schools titled the *Behavioral Health and Public Schools Framework*, and an organizational tool titled *The Flexible Framework*. Our project will use both of these important tools to inform and guide our work.

The Behavioral Health and Public Schools Framework provides detailed guidance in district level changes and background research. It was based on findings from a detailed survey across the state on individual school needs in the area of public health. We have used these tools as a guide to shape the strategies used in Worcester HEARS.

The Worcester HEARS project will implement interventions in three tiers:

Tier I: Universal Interventions: Interventions that will target and effect all students within HEARS schools. These include: A) School wide enhancements in pedagogy and discipline, in order to create a safer and supportive school environment: Specific practices and changes will be aligned with State guidance, and training will be provided by Lesley University and The Community of Practice Working group. This will be the most significant strategy in the Worcester HEARS project, and have the widest effect.

B) Social and Emotional Learning curriculum: The HEARS project will begin with a school wide exploration into the practices and pedagogy techniques that may affect students with trauma. In Year 2 of the grant, we will invest in a research based, proactive social and emotional learning curriculum that matches the needs of each school, such as Restorative Justice training, enhanced PBIS implementation, Mindfulness Training, or other curriculum recommended by the Collaborative for Academic, Social and Emotional Learning (CASEL) or the SEARCH Institute.

Tier II: Targeted Interventions: These interventions will target students who are having some academic or behavioral difficulty, but are not in need of intensive services. These interventions include:

- A) Meeting with the HEARS Support Team to identify best practices for educators within the school.
- B) Restorative Justice Action: Including conflict resolution with teachers and staff.
- C) If necessary, connection to outside agencies for non-clinical support. Can include leadership building activities, after school clubs, etc...

Tier III: Intensive Interventions: These interventions will target students who have serious behavioral or safety issues: They often require immediate de-escalation and support.


- A) We will work with our community partners and the Hears Support Team to create an enhanced and more effective referral system for behavioral health services.
- B) We will allow behavioral health agencies to provide counseling afterschool, on site with students and families in Worcester HEARS schools.

C) The HEARS Support Team will provide support to school staff who are struggling with students who need de-escalation. The HEARS Support Team can provide immediate, first response support and connect the student with the appropriate clinical service.

To ensure that schools are prepared for this work, and that students have access to the necessary resources, we will hire two staff members that will form the HEARS Support Team (HST). The two staff, a Clinician and Social Worker, will work with students in need of immediate intervention, connect students to the appropriate resources, and work with individual teachers to build classroom practices which will support all students.

Worcester HEARS: Logic Model

The Logic Model below illustrates the groups that will receive training through the HEARs grant, the trainings that will be offered, and the additional supports that will be provided to students, families, and educators.



Interventions and Training

<u>The Flexible Framework:</u> The Flexible Framework is designed to help school districts develop a plan for integrating traumasensitive routines and individual supports into the school day. Our initiative will engage both families and community providers in planning for a collaborative, evidence based model and implementation plan to address the impact of toxic stress, or ACES on Worcester's young people and to implement a universal approach for building resilience in students. Worcester HEARS will accomplish this through (1) providing training and ongoing support to teachers, parents and caregivers and community based youth development workers (2) aligning a trauma-informed response across the three principal environments of school, home, and community.

The Flexible Framework is still a new model, and the Worcester Public Schools will work with our evaluator, Dr. Mary Brolin to evaluate its effectiveness across the five participating school sites. The six areas of focus are based on the Flexible Frameworks theory of action, and are aligned with the implementation strategies recommended by the Trauma and Learning Policy Institute.

<u>Hears Support Team:</u> The Worcester Public Schools will hire one Behavioral Health Clinician and one Licensed Social Worker to support all five HEARS sites in their implementation of the Flexible Framework throughout the HEARS project. This team will provide immediate interventions with highly disregulated students, connect students to additional community resources if necessary, and offer guidance to teachers and staff within HEARS sites. The two professionals will work alongside school staff at all five sites to build trauma sensitive education practices into all teachers' daily pedagogy. This team will work directly with the Community of Practice working group to identify behavioral health services that are available to students in need, and connect the students with those resources.

<u>Lesley University Training:</u> In partnership with Massachusetts Advocates for Children and Harvard Law School, as well as the Oak Foundation, Lesley has created a sequence of courses that focus on trauma, designed explicitly for school-based educators, administrators, and other staff. If teachers complete the four courses in the sequence, they will receive a Trauma and Learning Professional Certificate. The courses examine the impact of traumatic experience on student learning (both academic and social/emotional) and provide a structured approach to individual and school wide interventions.

School Based Health Center

The organization Family Health Center of Worcester has agreed to partner with the Worcester HEARS project, and open a School Based Health Center in Worcester East Middle School, the largest HEARS site. This School Based Health Center will be an important component of the HEARS program, as it will combine health and dental services with key behavioral health services in Worcester East Middle School. Students will have access to counseling, healthcare, and another safe space within their building. The behavioral health staff will also collaborate with teachers to implement the Flexible Framework, and integrate trauma sensitive practices into their daily work. The School Based Health Center will host a full time Nurse Practitioner, a full time Medical Coordinator, and a full time Behavioral Health Provider. All salaries in the Health Center will be largely offset by billing student health insurances for medical services provided. This will build sustainability within the program, and ensure its success beyond grant completion.

<u>Community of Practice and Family and Community Engagement Working Groups:</u> The Community of Practice and Family and Community Engagement working groups will provide vital community participation in the HEARS project. Both groups are composed primarily of community partners, and have been meeting monthly for the duration of the planning grant period to shape the implementation plan, and educate the Worcester Public School staff members on resources available within the Worcester community. During the implementation period, these working groups will continue to meet, and their work will help ensure the sustainability of the HEARS project.

Timeline

The Worcester HEARS implementation period will begin in February 2016. Between February and June, the groundwork for the school wide implementation will be put into place, including training of necessary staff and community organizations. In the fall of 2016, all participating schools will begin the Flexible Framework Process, and teachers will receive targeted Lesley training. The program will be fully implemented in schools by December 2016. At that point, the HEARS team will apply for the next year of funding from The Health Foundation of Central Massachusetts.

Evaluation

The Worcester HEARS evaluation aims to provide readily-useful information to document program implementation and assess outcomes. The evaluation will assess (1) process, including implementation of trainings and the flexible framework, the community of practice, and family and community engagement efforts, as well as partners taking part in the work groups; and (2) outcomes in terms of changes in knowledge, attitudes and behaviors among those trained; school climate, and student attendance, disciplinary referrals, and mental health referrals and access.

Outcomes

If the program is successful, the Worcester HEARS pilot schools will see:

- By 2019, students in integration schools will demonstrate significantly lower levels of chronic absenteeism relative to students in comparison schools.
- By 2019, students in integration schools will significantly reduce their level of disciplinary referrals/infractions relative to students in comparison schools.
- By 2019, teachers in integration schools will have significantly less turnover relative to teachers in comparison schools, after accounting for retirements and any positive turnover.
- By 2019, students in integration schools will demonstrate higher rates of stability relative to students in comparison schools.
- By 2019, students in integration schools will significantly increase their academic achievement (e.g., standardized testing scores) relative to students in comparison schools.
- Educators within the intervention schools will show improvements in their knowledge, attitudes and behaviors concerning trauma and learning relative to their baseline assessment.
- 95% of the educators who complete the Lesley course will receive passing grades.
- By 2019, students in integration schools will significantly reduce their level of disciplinary referrals/infractions relative to students in comparison schools.
- By 2019, students in integration schools will significantly increase their academic achievement (e.g., standardized testing scores) relative to students in comparison schools.
- By 2019, students in integration schools will significantly reduce their level of disciplinary referrals/infractions for trauma related categories relative to students in comparison schools.
- The Community and Family Engagement Framework will be reviewed and accepted by community partners and the school district.
- The Community of Practice Framework will be reviewed and accepted by community partners and the school district
- Community agencies will be able to run services for students at school sites, after school.
- Community agencies will help teachers and school leaders develop Flexible Framework Action Plans.
- Parents and family members will show increased engagement and participation within school sites.
- Parents will be involved in creating the final Flexible Framework Action Plans.
- The number of parents involved in school site councils will increase at each school.
- At least 5 parents will complete the full six-session WCCC People Empowering People training.
