Motor Vehicle Pursuits

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PURPOSE:

This policy provides guidelines for the pursuit of motor vehicles.

POLICY:

A motor vehicle pursuit is justified when the necessity of the apprehension of a suspect outweighs the risk created by the pursuit. Officers shall continually evaluate all circumstances surrounding a pursuit. If the degree of danger to the public, the pursuing officer(s), and/or the suspect(s) is greater than the necessity for immediate apprehension, a pursuit should not be initiated, or if in progress, it should be terminated.

Pursuit driving is not justified and is prohibited unless the occupants of the vehicle are known to be wanted for the commission or the attempted commission of a violent felony or the vehicle is being operated in an erratic or dangerous manner which poses a threat of harm to the public if it is not stopped.

The pursuit of a motor vehicle, for the commission of a minor motor vehicle violation and /or operating a stolen motor vehicle, is therefore prohibited unless operated in an erratic and dangerous manner.

LOCALITY:

The City of Worcester is a highly congested urban area which generally precludes pursuit driving in a safe manner. Therefore, every effort shall be made to prevent a suspect vehicle from escalating a situation into one which requires a pursuit. Pursuit driving is only permitted in situations that represent a threat of harm to the public or the officers, if the suspect vehicle and/or occupants are not apprehended. The Department recognizes that it is better to allow a suspect to escape than to engage in a pursuit under conditions that unnecessarily jeopardize the safety of any person.

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Definitions	Authorized Police Vehicle	A police department issued motor vehicle equipped with operable emergency warning equipment that is constantly engaged for the duration of the pursuit.
	Densely Populated Area	An area of the City of Worcester that is thickly settled and/or comprised of a business district marked by compactness, pedestrian and vehicular traffic.
	Discontinuing Pursuit	This means informing the dispatcher that you are no longer engaged in pursuing a suspect vehicle and are turning off the police vehicle's emergency warning equipment while simultaneously reducing the speed of the police vehicle to the speed limit for the roadway, observing all motor vehicle and traffic laws, and disengaging from following the suspect vehicle. The location at which you are discontinuing the pursuit shall be immediately broadcast to the Dispatcher.
	Supervisory Order Discontinuance of Pursuit	Department members shall discontinue a pursuit when conditions make it unreasonable to continue and/or when ordered to do so by the Operations Division Supervisor, Patrol Shift Commander or Command Staff Member of the Police Department. The same factors which were considered prior to engaging in a pursuit shall be continuously considered in determining whether or not to discontinue a pursuit once it has begun.
	Primary Unit	An authorized police vehicle that is the first vehicle behind the pursued vehicle.
	Secondary Unit	An authorized police vehicle that is actively involved in the pursuit behind the primary unit as a back-up.
	Supervisor	A police official from the Operations Division.
	Transmitting information	<p>When an officer encounters a situation where a pursuit is warranted, the officer shall notify the Dispatcher immediately. Whenever the operator of the vehicle which is being pursued fails to stop after having been directed or signaled to do so, the pursuing officer shall immediately inform the dispatcher on the relevant police radio frequency (F1 or F2) based upon location of pursuit, of the following information:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. The call sign of the unit involved in the pursuit. 2. The reason for the pursuit. 3. The best possible description of the vehicle and its occupants. 4. The direction of travel, the roadways being used, the estimated speed of the suspect vehicle and the speed of the police vehicle. <p>This information must be constantly updated by the pursuing unit.</p>
	Vehicular Pursuit	An active attempt by an officer in an authorized emergency vehicle, with emergency warning equipment activated, to apprehend one or more occupants of another moving vehicle,

		when the officer reasonable believes that the driver of the other moving vehicle is resisting apprehension by increasing the vehicle's speed, intentionally ignoring the officer, or who is actively attempting to elude the police.
<u>*Prohibited Pursuits</u>	Highway – Wrong direction of travel	Pursuing suspects the wrong way on a controlled access or divided highway shall not occur. In the event that the vehicle being pursued enters the divided highway the wrong way, the following options should be considered: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Maintain visual contact with the suspect vehicle by paralleling it on the correct side of the highway. 2. Request other units to observe the exits available to the suspect vehicle.
	Pursuits with Civilian passenger	Officers shall not engage in a pursuit when their vehicle is occupied by prisoners, suspects, complainants, witnesses or any other persons not on duty either as police officers or from another law enforcement agency working or assisting the Department. This restriction applies regardless of whether or not the passenger has signed a waiver of liability, (i.e. ride-alongs).
	Personal Vehicles	No police officer shall use a personal or private motor vehicle to engage in a pursuit. An officer who witnesses the commission or attempted commission of a violent or life threatening felony or observes a vehicle being operated in an erratic or dangerous manner which poses a threat of harm to the public if it is not stopped shall, if they are in a personal or private motor vehicle, notify the Operations Division of the vehicle involved, its direction of travel and the crime involved. The officer may then, with the permission of the supervisor, follow the vehicle but only if it is possible to do so in conformance to all traffic laws and without creating an undue risk of harm to the public or themselves.
	Prisoner Transport Vehicle	At no time shall the operator of the Patrol Wagon engage in a pursuit.
	Lake Boat Patrol	At no time shall anyone operating the Lake Boat or other WPD aquatic vehicle engage in a pursuit.
Vehicle Surveillance Procedures	Consistent with Department policy that a pursuit be avoided whenever possible, officers shall take the following steps	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Immediately notify the Dispatcher that a suspect vehicle is under surveillance and report their call sign, the reason for the surveillance, the best possible description of the suspect vehicle and its occupants, its direction of travel and roadways being used; 2. Follow the suspect vehicle at a discreet and safe distance, constantly informing the Dispatcher of the progress of the surveillance. Blue lights and siren shall <u>not</u> be utilized during the surveillance phase; 3. The Supervisor shall utilize all resources available to limit

	whenever they have a suspect vehicle under surveillance that they seek to pull over:	<p>the mobility of the suspect vehicle to include dispatching additional units to the immediate area to discourage initiation of a pursuit by the vehicle under surveillance.</p> <p>4. Blue lights and siren shall only be utilized after the suspect vehicle actively attempts to evade the police unit which is conducting the surveillance or accelerates and/or fails to stop after having been directed to do so.</p>
Pursuit Decision	No officer shall initiate a vehicular pursuit unless the officer reasonably believes that:	<p>1. The continued operation of the vehicle that the officer intends to stop poses a threat of physical harm to the public or others; and/or</p> <p>2. The occupant(s) of the vehicle that the officer intends to stop pose a threat of physical harm to the public or others.</p>
		<u>In making this determination, the following factors shall be considered by the officer, but are not limited to:</u>
	The Threat to Public Safety in the Absence of the Pursuit	<p>1. Severity of crime/offense believed to have been committed by one or more occupants of the vehicle;</p> <p>2. Nature and degree of the threat to public safety should the vehicle not be stopped;</p> <p>3. Alternatives to pursuit;</p> <p>4. Whether the identity of the occupant is known to the point where later apprehension is possible.</p>
	The Foreseeable Threat to Public Safety Arising from the Pursuit	<p>1. Driving skills of the officer and the performance capabilities of the pursuit vehicle.</p> <p>2. Type of area (residential, commercial, school zone; and the volume, type, speed and direction of vehicle traffic);</p> <p>3. Population density (including volume of pedestrian traffic);</p> <p>4. Presence and operational status of emergency warning equipment (lights and sirens);</p> <p>5. Type of police vehicle (unmarked cruiser, marked cruiser, motorcycle);</p> <p>6. Time of day;</p> <p>7. Road and weather conditions;</p> <p>8. Officer(s) familiarity with the area;</p> <p>9. Speeds involved;</p> <p>10. Quality of radio communications;</p> <p>11. Presence of other persons in the pursued vehicle;</p> <p>12. Other circumstances or conditions which mitigate or aggravate hazards associated with the pursuit.</p>
		If the degree of danger to the public, the pursuing officer(s), and/or the suspect(s) is greater than the necessity for immediate apprehension, a pursuit should not be initiated or, if in progress, terminated.

<p>Pursuit Operations (continued)</p>	<p>Unit</p> <p>Primary Unit (continued)</p>	<p>assignment, reason for the pursuit, location, description of operator and occupants, direction of travel, speed and traffic conditions;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Activate all emergency visual and audible systems; • Provide the original reason for the attempt to stop the motor vehicle and a vehicle description; • Once a secondary unit has responded to the pursuit, and positioned itself behind the primary pursuit unit, the secondary unit should assume the duties to continually broadcast the location, direction, speed and road conditions; • Continually broadcast the location, direction, speed, and road conditions; • Continually re-evaluate the risk to public safety • Advise the Operations Division Supervisor and render assistance to any civilian vehicle involved in a crash; • <u>Assistance to injured parties will take precedence over the continuation of the pursuit;</u> • Conduct a comprehensive follow-up investigation in the event the operator eludes apprehension. • The officer operating the primary pursuit vehicle shall be prepared to articulate the facts justifying any decision to initiate, continue, and/or discontinue a pursuit. • Operate cruiser in accordance with M.G.L.89-7B. <p>MGL 89-7B states:</p> <p><i>The driver of a vehicle of a fire, police or recognized protective department and the driver of an ambulance shall be subject to the provisions of any statute, rule, regulation, ordinance or by-law relating to the operation or parking of vehicles, except that a driver of fire apparatus while going to a fire or responding to an alarm, or the driver of a vehicle of a police or recognized protective department or the driver of an ambulance, in an emergency and while in performance of a public duty or while transporting a sick or injured person to a hospital or other destination where professional medical services are available, may drive such vehicle at a speed in excess of the applicable speed limit if he exercises caution and due regard under the circumstances for the safety of persons and property, and may drive such vehicle through an intersection of ways contrary to any traffic signs or signals regulating traffic at such intersection if he first brings such vehicle to a full stop and then proceeds with caution and due regard for the safety of persons and property, unless otherwise directed by a police officer regulating traffic at such intersection. The driver of any such approaching emergency vehicle shall comply with the provisions of section fourteen of chapter ninety when approaching a school bus which has stopped to allow passengers to alight or board from the same, and whose red lamps are flashing.</i></p>
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	Dispatcher	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Notify an Operations Division Supervisor of the pursuit and broadcast to clear the airwaves and deploy any additional units deemed necessary. • Receive, record, and coordinate information of the pursuit and the pursued vehicle. • Have information broadcast to other police frequencies. • Notify contiguous community if it appears that pursuit may enter their jurisdiction and if it is a <i>Courtesy Notification</i> with no participation or if we are requesting <i>Mutual Aid</i> assistance. • Enter information on electronic journal.
Pursuit Operations (continued)	Ops Division Supervisor Operations Division Supervisor (continued)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Monitor and evaluate any pursuit which occurs in his area of responsibility and limit participation therein. • Personally broadcast that he/she has assumed command of the pursuit. • Be prepared to order the pursuit to be discontinued and do so if conditions warrant it. • In the event the Pursuit Officer is unable to transmit sufficient information, as stated on page 2 ‘Transmitting Information’, to allow the Operations Division Supervisor to properly evaluate the pursuit, He/She may order the pursuit terminated. • If the degree of danger to the public, the pursuing officer(s), and/or the suspect(s) is greater than the necessity for immediate apprehension, a pursuit should not be initiated, or if in progress, terminated. • Be responsible for controlling police action at the scene of the termination of a pursuit and ensuring adherence to Department policies. • Retain supervisory responsibility until the termination scene is cleared and all reports are completed. • Before the end of the tour of duty, complete a Pursuit Summary Sheet and submit it to the Shift Commander.
	Crash Investigations	<p>The Operations Division Supervisor shall assign an officer from the Patrol Division, who was not involved in the pursuit, to conduct the investigation of a motor vehicle accident that occurs as a result of a pursuit.</p> <p>When necessary, due to severity of a crash, the Traffic Division and Crime Scene Unit shall respond and conduct the investigation as with all accidents of a critical nature.</p>
	Rank/Authority	Regardless of the rank of the pursuing officer, the Operations Division Supervisor shall remain in command and control of the pursuit for the entire duration.
	Pursuit into other Jurisdictions	<p>When a pursued vehicle leaves the city pursuing officers shall notify the dispatcher who shall transmit the information previously outlined to the police department having primary jurisdiction.</p> <p>Pursuit driving is not justified and is prohibited unless the</p>

Arrest on fresh and continued pursuit</p> <p>A police officer of a city or town who is empowered to make arrests within a city or town may, on fresh and continued pursuit, exercise such authority in any other city or town for any offence committed in his presence within his jurisdiction for which he would have the right to arrest within his jurisdiction without a warrant. Said officer may return any person so arrested to the jurisdiction wherein said offence was committed. Nothing contained in this section shall be construed as limiting the powers of a police officer to make arrests and in so far as possible this section shall be deemed to be declaratory of the common law of the commonwealth.</p> <p>In addition, Inter-Jurisdictional pursuits must be authorized by an Operations Division Supervisor.</p> <p>Should a wanted person enter a jurisdiction from the City of Worcester, the dispatcher shall notify the agency of primary jurisdiction of the suspect's presence and the specific violation for which the suspect is wanted.</p>
	<p>Out of State Pursuits</p>	<p>If a felony has been committed, the Operations Division Supervisor may authorize the pursuing officer(s) to continue pursuit into another state. If this occurs, the Operations Division Supervisor shall immediately:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Notify the law enforcement agency of jurisdiction and request their assistance; • Require that the first out-of-state law enforcement vehicle that joins the pursuit become the primary pursuit vehicle; and • Direct the Worcester Police vehicle to become a backup unit; and • Direct the Worcester Police officer(s) involved to return to the Commonwealth as soon as the pursuit investigation is terminated.
	<p>Secondary Unit</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Notify the Dispatcher of his/her participation in the pursuit;

		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Maintain a safe distance behind the primary unit, but be close enough to provide aid; and • Assume radio communications. • Only two (2) Worcester Police vehicles may engage in active pursuit. <p>The Operations Division Supervisor may permit additional Police Units to assist in a pursuit if he/she determines circumstances warrant it.</p> <p>Police Units not directly engaged in the pursuit but in close proximity to the pursuit shall immediately notify the Dispatcher. These officers shall position themselves on alternate/parallel roadways to provide assistance in the event the suspect eludes the pursuing officer(s), flees on foot, or as otherwise directed by the Operations Division Supervisor.</p>
<p>Pursuit Operations (continued)</p>	<p>Termination of Pursuit</p> <p>Termination of Pursuit (continued)</p>	<p>Officers may immediately terminate a pursuit when <u>any</u> of the following conditions exist:</p> <p>Department members shall discontinue a pursuit when conditions make it unreasonable to continue and/or;</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Radio communications with the Dispatcher and Operations Division Supervisor cannot be established or lapse during the pursuit; (Car to Car) radio transmissions may be made by selecting the setting “Conventional” on the police radio. 2. When the initiating officer determines that the risks of continuing the pursuit outweigh the maintenance of public safety. The same factors which were considered prior to engaging in a pursuit shall be continuously considered in determining whether or not to discontinue a pursuit once it has begun. 3. When the suspect vehicle is a motorcycle and the suspect operates it in such a way as to present a greater immediate risk to the public due to the motorcycle’s greater maneuverability. 4. When ordered to do so by the Operations Division Supervisor, Patrol Shift Commander or any Command Staff Member of the Police Department.
<p>Other Law Enforcement Agency Pursuits</p>	<p>Assist other agencies</p>	<p>Once a law enforcement agency notifies the Worcester Police that they are in pursuit and entering the City, the caller must be identified and specifically asked:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Whether they are making a request for Worcester Police assistance or making a courtesy notification with NO Worcester Police participation requested. <p>Once a request for assistance is made, an Operations Division Supervisor shall determine if the Worcester Police will participate. In addition to becoming familiar with the details of</p>

		<p>the pursuit as soon as possible, guidelines that the supervisor shall utilize shall include but not be limited to:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. <p>Other Law Enforcement Agency Pursuits (continued)</p>	<p>Assisting Other Agencies (Continued)</p>	<p>If approval is granted, Worcester Police officer(s) shall take up a position of advantage, with the potential to assist if necessary, a lone officer of the other agency. A Worcester Police Officer shall only continue assisting another department leaving the City of Worcester if the initiating agency's officer is alone. When a pursuit initiated by another agency leaves the City of Worcester with at least two units from other agencies in pursuit, Worcester Police Department officers shall terminate their pursuit and assistance at the City line, unless directed otherwise by an Operations Division Supervisor. The role of the Worcester Police Officer involved in such a pursuit will be only to assist the primary agency.</p> <p>Once the pursuit is no longer active, the Operations Division Supervisor shall order all Worcester Police Officers to return to the city. Crimes committed within the City shall be followed up by the assisting Worcester Police Officer.</p> <p>All Worcester Police Officers directly or indirectly involved in a pursuit initiated by another law enforcement agency shall adhere to all requirements established in the Worcester Police Department Duty Manual of Policies and Procedures as well as Rules and Regulations.</p>

Pursuit Driving Tactics	Barricading Roadways	Barricading a roadway is justified only in those situations where the suspect has committed a violent or life-threatening felony and where all other methods of apprehension have failed or would be ineffective. Only a Shift Commander or Command Staff Member may authorize that a roadway be barricaded for the purpose of apprehending the occupant(s) of a suspect vehicle. Whenever a barricade is utilized department vehicles shall utilize full emergency lights and no one shall remain in or directly behind the barricade or vehicle(s). The barricade shall never be around a 'blind corner', shall be plainly visible from a sufficient distance, and should be implemented in such a way as to have the suspect voluntarily stop fleeing.
	Caravanning	Only two (2) Worcester Police vehicles may engage in an active pursuit. An Operations Division Supervisor may permit additional officers to assist in a pursuit if circumstances warrant it.
	Deliberate Contact	Deliberate contact is prohibited unless specifically authorized and ordered by the Operations Division Supervisor, Patrol Shift Commander, or Command Staff Member and where the suspect poses an imminent threat of death or serious bodily harm to the public or officers.
	Firearms Discharges	Firearms shall not be discharged at or from a moving vehicle unless the officer is being threatened with deadly force by an occupant of the target vehicle. This prohibition exists for two reasons: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. The probability that bullets might ricochet and cause injury to innocent persons; and/or 2. The probability of the suspect vehicle crashing and causing injury to innocent persons if the bullets do not ricochet, but disable the operator.
	Motorcycle Units	If a pursuit is initiated by a motorcycle unit, the motorcycle unit shall discontinue the pursuit as soon as a marked Department vehicle engages in the pursuit. Department members may always discontinue a pursuit when conditions make it unreasonable to continue.
	Passing	Attempts to pass another police vehicle are prohibited, unless the police vehicle is disabled, a marked vehicle takes the lead from an unmarked vehicle or motorcycle, or ordered by the Operations Division Supervisor.
Pursuit Driving Tactics (continued)	Reckless/Hazardous Driving	Officers shall not duplicate the reckless operation displayed by fleeing suspects. Officers are strictly prohibited from wrong way operation on a controlled access or divided highway.
	Spacing	All units in pursuit shall space themselves at a safe distance to ensure proper braking and reaction time. As speed increases, the distance between vehicles should increase to allow for a greater need of reaction time.
	Tire Deflation	Should be considered as an effective option for bringing a pursuit

	Devices (Stop Sticks)	to a conclusion. These are used for vehicles with four or more wheels only and deployed on concrete or blacktop surfaces. The use of these devices is prohibited for motorcycles, ATV's, or any similar type vehicles.
	Units Parallel to Pursuit	Additional Worcester Police officers may operate with emergency visual and audible systems activated and assist by paralleling the pursuit or by pre-positioning themselves at likely avenues of escape. These assisting units are strictly prohibited from direct/active pursuit unless specifically authorized by an Operations Division Supervisor.
	Unmarked Units	Officers operating unmarked Worcester Police vehicles shall only engage in pursuits if they are equipped with emergency visual and audible systems and shall allow a marked/semi-marked unit to assume the primary pursuit position at the earliest opportunity. The unmarked vehicle shall then become the assisting unit until an additional marked/semi-marked Worcester Police vehicle can assume the secondary role. Once two marked/semi-marked Worcester Police vehicles have become actively involved in the pursuit, the unmarked vehicle shall immediately disengage from the pursuit unless specifically authorized by an Operations Division Supervisor to continue involvement in the pursuit.
Post Pursuit Document-ation and Review	Pursuit Officer	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Provide the Operations Division Supervisor with an incident report including information so he/she can complete the Pursuit Summary Sheet. (A copy of which is provided within and can also be found within the Department Forms Folder)
	Operations Division Supervisor	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Ensure that the Pursuit Officer has entered all pertinent information via incident report and is forwarded through the chain of command to the Deputy Chief of Patrol. • After receiving the relevant information from the Pursuing Officer, complete all required entries in the electronic Journal; • Submit a, Pursuit Summary Sheet through channels, to the Deputy Chief of Patrol with a copy to Training Division and BOPS; • Ensure follow-up investigation occurs for suspects who escape.
	Deputy Chief of Patrol	Appoint members to the Pursuit Review Committee.
	Pursuit Review Committee	Examine each pursuit to ensure compliance with this policy and report their findings to the Deputy Chief of Patrol. Modification or updating of this policy shall be made when based upon sound evidence gathered during this stage.
Training	Training Division Commander	Officers who drive police vehicles shall be given initial and periodic updated training in the agency's pursuit policy and in safe driving tactics.
