25TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE COLD STORAGE & WAREHOUSE FIRE

THE CITY OF WORCESTER MARKED THE 25TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE WORCESTER COLD STORAGE FIRE WITH A SOLEMN CEREMONY AT THE FRANKLIN STREET FIRE STATION ON DECEMBER 3RD, 2024, HONORING THE SIX FIREFIGHTERS WHO PERISHED IN THE LINE OF DUTY - LT. THOMAS SPENCER, LT. JAMES LYONS, FIREFIGHTER TIMOTHY JACKSON, FIREFIGHTER PAUL BROTHERTON, FIREFIGHTER JEREMIAH LUCEY AND FIREFIGHTER JOSEPH MCGUIRK. HUNDREDS OF FIREFIGHTERS IN FULL DRESS UNIFORM MARCHED THROUGH SILENT, SOMBER CROWDS, REINFORCING THE PLEDGE THAT WORCESTER WILL NEVER FORGET ITS FALLEN HEROES. ASSISTANT FIRE CHIEF ADAM ROCHE OPENED THE CEREMONY, EMPHASIZING THE CONTINUED COMMITMENT TO REMEMBER THE SACRIFICES OF THE WORCESTER 6.

MAYOR JOSEPH M. PETTY ADDRESSED THE GATHERING, REFLECTING ON THE UNITY AND RESILIENCE DISPLAYED BY THE COMMUNITY IN THE AFTERMATH OF THE TRAGEDY. HE HIGHLIGHTED HOW THE LEGACY OF THESE SIX BRAVE MEN CONTINUES TO INSPIRE THE CITY AND THE FIREFIGHTING COMMUNITY. CITY COUNCILOR AT-LARGE KATHLEEN M. TOOMEY, CHAIR OF THE PUBLIC SAFETY STANDING COMMITTEE, SPOKE OF THE ENDURING SUPPORT FOR THE FAMILIES OF THE FALLEN AND THE TEARS STILL SHED IN THEIR MEMORY. SHE ALSO ACKNOWLEDGED THE NEXT GENERATION OF FIREFIGHTERS FROM THE WORCESTER 6 FAMILIES WHO HAVE EMBRACED THE SAME CALL TO SERVICE.

OTHER MEMBERS OF THE WORCESTER CITY COUNCIL WERE PRESENT AS WELL, STANDING IN SOLIDARITY WITH THE FAMILIES AND FIREFIGHTERS. CITY MANAGER ERIC BATISTA REMINDED THE CROWD OF HOW THE SACRIFICES MADE THAT NIGHT HAVE CONTRIBUTED TO ADVANCEMENTS IN FIREFIGHTER SAFETY AND TRAINING, ENSURING A SAFER FUTURE FOR THOSE IN THE PROFESSION. FIRE CHIEF MARTIN W. DYER HONORED THE EXTRAORDINARY COURAGE OF THE FALLEN AND THE STRENGTH OF THEIR FAMILIES, REAFFIRMING THE FIRE DEPARTMENT'S PLEDGE TO KEEP THEIR MEMORY ALIVE.

Family members of the Worcester 6 participated in the ceremony, laying wreaths at the memorial in front of the station. Reverend Jonathan Slavinskas offered an invocation, calling for peace and comfort for the families and acknowledging the ultimate sacrifice made by these heroes.

The ceremony included the ringing of a ceremonial bell, a traditional symbol of a firefighter's final call, followed by a 21-gun salute. Attendees braved the cold to pay their respects, demonstrating the city's unwavering commitment to honoring its fallen. Chief Dyer recalled the courage and dedication of the Worcester 6, who faced unimaginable danger to protect their community. The evening served as a powerful reminder of their legacy, the unity they inspired, and the city's enduring vow to never forget.

DOWNTOWN WORCESTER BUSINESS IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT (BID) ANNUAL MEETING - 12/4

THE DOWNTOWN WORCESTER BUSINESS IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT'S 2024
ANNUAL MEETING WAS A VIBRANT GATHERING OF LOCAL LEADERS AND
STAKEHOLDERS COMMITTED TO THE CITY'S REVITALIZATION.
MAYOR JOSEPH PETTY SPOKE PASSIONATELY ABOUT THE CITY'S ONGOING
TRANSFORMATION, EMPHASIZING THE CRITICAL ROLE OF THE BID IN
FOSTERING ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND IMPROVING THE QUALITY OF LIFE
DOWNTOWN. DISTRICT 2 COUNCILOR CANDY MERO-CARLSON HIGHLIGHTED
THE COLLABORATIVE EFFORTS BETWEEN THE CITY, BUSINESSES, AND

GRAFTON HILL NEIGHBORHOOD MEETING - 12/4

ON DECEMBER 4TH, DISTRICT 3 CITY COUNCILOR GEORGE RUSSELL ATTENDED THE MONTHLY GRAFTON HILL NEIGHBORHOOD MEETING HELD AT THE MASS AUDUBON SOCIETY LOCATED ON MASSASOIT ROAD. THIS MEETING PROVIDED RESIDENTS WITH AN OPPORTUNITY TO VOICE CONCERNS DIRECTLY TO CITY DEPARTMENTS AND OFFICIALS, AS WELL AS RECEIVE UPDATES FROM THE WORCESTER POLICE DEPARTMENT AND THE QUALITY OF LIFE TEAM.

KEY TOPICS DISCUSSED INCLUDED THE NECESSARY WINDOW REPLACEMENTS AT WORCESTER EAST MIDDLE SCHOOL AND THE ONGOING ISSUES WITH TRAFFIC CONGESTION DURING SCHOOL PICK-UP AT ROOSEVELT ELEMENTARY SCHOOL. THE MEETING FOSTERED A PRODUCTIVE DIALOGUE BETWEEN COMMUNITY MEMBERS AND CITY LEADERS AND ALLOWED RESIDENTS TO STAY INFORMED AND ACTIVELY PARTICIPATE IN ADDRESSING LOCAL CHALLENGES.

WASHINGTON HEIGHTS APARTMENTS FIRE UPDATE PROVIDED BY DISTRICT 5 CITY COUNCILOR ETEL HAXHIAJ - 12/4

DISTRICT 5 CITY COUNCILOR ETEL HAXHIAJ PROVIDED A SIX-MONTH UPDATE ON THE WASHINGTON HEIGHTS APARTMENT FIRE, WHICH DISPLACED OVER THIRTY TENANTS ON JUNE 4, 2024. THE FIRE, WHICH DESTROYED 36 UNITS, DID NOT RESULT IN ANY LOSS OF LIFE, THANKS TO THE EFFORTS OF THE WORCESTER FIRE DEPARTMENT AND FIRST RESPONDERS.

OVER THE PAST SIX MONTHS, ALL DISPLACED RESIDENTS, WHO HAD BEEN TEMPORARILY HOUSED IN A HOTEL, HAVE NOW BEEN RE-HOUSED EITHER AT WASHINGTON HEIGHTS OR IN NEW COMMUNITIES. COUNCILOR HAXHIAJ WORKED CLOSELY WITH THE WORCESTER FIRE DEPARTMENT, CITY EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT, AND STATE REPRESENTATIVE DAVID LEBOEUF TO SUPPORT THE AFFECTED RESIDENTS. WEEKLY MEETINGS FOCUSED ON RE-HOUSING TENANTS, SALVAGING BELONGINGS, AND IMPLEMENTING FIRE PREVENTION SAFETY MEASURES AS REPAIRS TO THE BUILDING ARE UNDERWAY.

THE COUNCILOR PRAISED THE COLLABORATIVE EFFORT BETWEEN COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS, WASHINGTON HEIGHTS MANAGEMENT, AND LOCAL LEADERS IN ADDRESSING THE NEEDS OF THE DISPLACED RESIDENTS. LOOKING AHEAD, COUNCILOR HAXHIAJ REMAINS COMMITTED TO STRENGTHENING FIRE PREVENTION POLICIES AND ENHANCING THE EMERGENCY DISASTER FUND TO SUPPORT SURVIVORS OF FUTURE DISASTERS.

REMEMBRANCE & WREATH LAYING CEREMONY FOR JON DAVIES - 12/8

A CEREMONY WAS HELD ON SUNDAY, DECEMBER 8TH AT THE FIREFIGHTER MEMORIAL AT THE FRANKLIN STREET FIRE STATION TO MARK THE 13TH ANNIVERSARY OF WORCESTER FIREFIGHTER JON D. DAVIES SR.'S LINE-OF-DUTY DEATH. DAVIES, A 17-YEAR VETERAN OF THE WORCESTER FIRE DEPARTMENT, TRAGICALLY DIED WHILE BATTLING A THREE-ALARM FIRE AT 49 ARLINGTON ST. ON DECEMBER 8, 2011.

THE FIRE, INITIALLY A ROUTINE STRUCTURE FIRE IN A THREE-DECKER BUILDING, QUICKLY ESCALATED DUE TO UNFORESEEN CIRCUMSTANCES, LEADING TO A SUDDEN COLLAPSE THAT CLAIMED HIS LIFE. FELLOW FIREFIGHTERS, REMEMBER DAVIES AS A BIG, STRONG, AND KIND PERSON, WHEN REFLECTING ON THE SIGNIFICANCE OF THE NIGHT AND THE LOSSES THE DEPARTMENT HAS FACED. THE WORCESTER FIRE DEPARTMENT CONTINUES TO HONOR DAVIES AND ALL FALLEN FIREFIGHTERS BY CONSTANTLY IMPROVING AND ADAPTING THEIR OPERATIONS.

COUNCILOR TOOMEY WAS PRESENT AT THE CEREMONY, JOINING OTHERS IN PAYING RESPECTS TO DAVIES' MEMORY AND SERVICE. JON DAVIES IS SURVIVED BY THREE SONS, TWO OF WHOM, JON DAVIES JR. AND MICHAEL DAVIES, ARE ACTIVE FIREFIGHTERS IN WORCESTER.

Worcester Announces Permanent Winter Parking Ban in Effect Dec. 1 Through April 30



The City of Worcester announced Friday November 22, it's **Permanent Winter Parking Ban** will go into effect **Dec. 1, 2024**, and will remain through **April 30, 2025 (April 1 for residential streets)**. The Permanent Winter Parking Ban applies to emergency arteries, WRTA bus routes, and streets that are critical to the flow of traffic. There is no parking on one or both sides of the affected street between 2 a.m. and 6 a.m. nor any time a snow emergency is declared.

In addition to the Permanent Winter Parking Ban, a Declared Winter Parking Ban will go into effect on all other city streets whenever accumulating snow is forecast. When a declared ban is in effect, parking is allowed only on the odd-numbered side of other streets, unless posted otherwise, and municipal parking garages will be free to use until noted following the ban's lifting. Parking enforcement—including ticketing and towing—will be active during a Declared Ban, as adherence to parking bans is critical to allow municipal crews to keep roadways clear and safe.

Worcester 311 is the official source for up-to-date information on winter parking bans, parking regulations on your street, and snow complaints.

Illegally parked vehicles are the biggest obstacle to effective snow removal efforts. Vehicles that violate the winter parking ban or otherwise hinder snow removal will be ticketed and towed at the owner's expense. Winter Parking Rules

Winter parking bans on public streets fall under two categories, PERMANENT and DECLARED.

- A PERMANENT BAN remains in effect from December 1st through April 30th on Emergency Arteries, WRTA Bus Routes, and streets that are critical to the flow of traffic. There is no parking on one or both sides of the street between 2 a.m. and 6 a.m. and anytime a snow emergency is declared.
- A DECLARED BAN is put into effect on all remaining city streets whenever accumulating snow is forecast. When a Declared Ban is in effect, restrictions apply that typically allow parking on one side of the street.
