



International Peer-Reviewed Definition of Zero Waste




Residential Trash (1-6 units)




Residential Trash (7+ units)

Answered: 1,060 Skipped: 760

Do not like the yellow bags (cost, quality) 16%

Would like bulk waste collection 9%

Concerned about wind debris and waste containment 6%


Would like more litter cleanup 4%


Answered: 1,426 Skipped: 394

WORKSHOP 1 – What are the challenges?

Some people say they are too busy or don't care

Taking bulk items to drop-off center isn't always possible

When students move out of dorms, reusable items (ex. fans) are thrown away

Recycling is blowing everywhere

Yellow bags are thin

Consistency in communication

Need recycling education at schools, businesses

Drop-off center hours are too restrictive



WHAT IS A VISION STATEMENT?

A vision statement is a clear and inspiring expression of an organization's long-term goals, describing the future it ultimately aims to create.

It answers the question, "What will the world look like if we succeed?" and serves as a guiding light—providing direction, inspiring action, and aligning efforts with the organization's core values.

SAMPLE VISION STATEMENTS

- When implemented, Baltimore's Fair Development Plan for Zero Waste will achieve these outcomes: Clean Air, Clean Communities, Reclaim Communities, Build Community Power, More Jobs, Create Less Waste.
- In pursuit of building a more equitable solid waste management system that enhances the natural beauty and standard of living across our great city, the Government of the District of Columbia commits to ensuring a just transition to zero waste, where solutions are convenient, accessible, and affordable for all, with support focused on low-income households and small businesses.
- Vision: Missoulians will adopt and normalize Zero Waste behaviors with the increase of convenient, affordable Zero Waste services and programs.

STAKEHOLDER ZERO WASTE VISION IDEAS

- Options for a clean city for all folks visiting and living in Worcester (unhoused included).
- Zero Waste is everyone's responsibility, and we all should join together to undo the harm caused to our planet
- A cleaner Worcester, less litter in the streets.
- Cleaner city, programs that promote composting, reducing organic waste, sites/locations that allow the community to dispose of household items.
- Zero Waste in Worcester should be a commitment to sustainability, community engagement and a healthier environment.
- Zero waste should not only be an environmental goal but also a commitment of responsible government budgeting.

STAKEHOLDER ZERO WASTE VISION IDEAS

- The cleanest city in New England
- A future with less consumption
- Make zero waste a community value a culture shift
- A clean city litter free
- Radical upcycling
- Circular economy, everything to be reused, remanufactured
- Meaningful reduce and reuse anything that you have in your household

SHAPING IDEAS INTO A VISION

- Zero Waste Worcester: become the cleanest, greenest, least wasteful midsized city nationwide by 2050.
- Zero Waste Worcester: a community that values working together to eliminate litter and reduce waste, converting what's left into reusable, affordable resources for all.
- Zero Waste Worcester: a future with clean streets and sidewalks, thoughtful consumption, efficient and affordable recycling, fostering community pride.
